In the 70's it was not unusual for a female high school student to be a class and school leader. Unfortunately, success later in life on a high scale was often not available to women, even those with outstanding credentials.

Ms. Kimberly Ridings, a former high school student of Furniture City High Twelve Past President and Michigan State President Michael Clark accepted his invitation to be a speaker at a recent High Twelve luncheon.

Kim has excelled in the business world with degrees in

construction management, architectural drafting and a Master's Degree in Management.

Kim along with her husband Jeff, manage over 500,000 square feet of office space in Greater Grand Rapids and she is a strong advocate of bringing women into the construction industry in non-traditional roles.

Kim is the immediate Past President of the Mary Free Bed Hospital Guild, a prestigious position with one of the largest rehabilitation hospitals in the country. Kim oversaw a recent large expansion of the Mary Free Bed facilities in downtown Grand Rapids, just two blocks from the Grand Rapids Masonic Temple.

Kim's presentation centered on the recent expansion and the wide variety of services provided by The Mary Free Bed Hospital to the citizens of West Michigan, where she now serves as a member of the Hospital Board

of Trustees.

Kim was recently named a YWCA Woman of Achievement and was named one of the fifty, 2016 West Michigan Women of Achievement.

Kim also serves as a trustee on the board of the Wade Sackner Foundation, a foundation funded by a trust left by Brother Wade Sackner of Grand Rapids Masonic Lodge No. 34. The foundation annually distributes over \$300,000.00 in funds to help local charities, which were close to Brother Sackner, including the Red Cross, YMCA, Heart of West Michigan, Mary Free Bed Hospital and the Saladin Shrine.

Senior Wolcott Fellow Tom Wallis (2014): My name is Tom Wallace. I'm originally from Michigan (Go Blue),



and received the Wolcott Fellowship to attend the Elliott School of International Affairs in 2012-2014, where I received an MA in Security Studies. California High Twelve Association, Fresno High Twelve Club: The Square and Compasses (or, more definitively, a Square and a set of Compasses which are joined together...each leg of the compass pointing in opposite directions) is the single most universally identifiable symbol of Freemasonry. Due to slight Masonic jurisdictional differences around the world, this symbol does not always look exactly the same to all Freemasons. Some jurisdictions call this symbol the Square and Compass, (non-plural) and a few jurisdictions omit the G at its center. But, no matter its slightly different look, all Freemasons are in unison as to what this symbol means to them within the fraternity.

Speculative Masonic Symbolism of the Square and Compasses: In speculative Freemasonry, this emblematic symbol is used in Masonic ritual. The Square is an emblem of virtue in which we must square our actions by the square of virtue with all mankind.

The Compasses exemplify our wisdom of conduct... the strength to circumscribe our desires and keep our passions within due bounds.

When these 2 Masonic tools are placed together with God (the Creator) as our central focal point... (Just as King Solomon built God's Temple, first... and then built his house around it), peace and harmony is the result.

The Information below may be found in Mackey's Revised Encyclopedia of Freemasonry, Volume 2, Page 963, 1929. A Short History About the Square and Compasses: THE SQUARE...Morality; THE COMPASS...Boundaries; Trying Square: In the operative stone mason era, the 90 degree angle of the square was a necessary tool used to test the accuracy of the sides of a stone to ascertain that the stone's angles matched the square's true right angle; Morality: In speculative Freemasonry, the square is a symbol of morality.

Official Masonic Usage: 1. it is one of the 3 Great Lights (the Square, the Compass and the Holy Book). 2. It is the working tool of a Fellowcraft; 3. It is the official emblem of the Master of the Lodge. In each of its above roles, it inculcates (teaches) the repeated lesson of morality, truthfulness and honesty.

This bulletin will continue the format and the history of the various American Flags from the War of 1812 to the

Civil War. So hang now and let the show begin:

**1795-**The official design is modified and updated to include two more states into the Union: Kentucky and Vermont. The stars pattern has now shifted away from the circle to five staggered rows.



**1814** - Inspired by the majesty of the flag and its visual impact during the War of 1812, Francis Scott Key pens a tune he titles The Star-Spangled Banner. The song's patriotic message earns it national recognition. It is officially adopted in 1931 as the national anthem.

**1818 -** The official flag is modified and updated to showcase five additional stars on the blue field in honor of Tennessee, Ohio, Louisiana, Mississippi and Indiana receiving state status. The stars are now arranged in four rows of five across.

**1819 -** The flag is updated at the end of the year when Illinois is added into the Union. The 21 stars are now arranged with one row of four with one row of five on top and two rows of five below.



**1820 -** Two more stars are added with the inclusion of Alabama and Maine. The 23 stars are now arranged with one row of five with one row of six on top and two rows of six below.

**1822-1867 -** Fourteen more stars are added to the flag with the inclusion of Missouri, Arkansas, Michigan, Florida, Texas, Iowa, Wisconsin, California, Minnesota, Oregon, Kansas, West Virginia, Nevada and Nebraska. There are now thirty seven stars on the American Flag.











**1861-1865** - The rival of the Stars and Stripes, the official flag of the Confederate States of America, is created. This flag goes through three major iterations before the South falls to General Grant in 1865, including the Stars and Bars, which played off of Ross's original design, The Stainless Banner, which featured the Confederate battle symbol (the blue starred X pattern on the red background) in the upper left corner of a white field, and The Blood Stained Banner, which added a red bar onto the right side of the second iteration. There was also a popular though unofficial Bonnie Blue Flag that featured a deep blue field with one large white star on it. In popular memory, the Confederate Battle Flag is remembered as the flag of the confederacy, even though it was never officially considered that.
