Retirees lead the charge for students to understand civics!



Bernhard Kainer, Past Club President and now Club Secretary observed people struggle with simple civics questions during a popular segment on the Jay Leno show, then found research showing most Americans don't know the basics of government, he decided to take action. With the help of other members in his Palm Beach County Masonic Temple, he

launched a Government Bee in district

Bernhard Kainer couldn't believe what he was seeing on his television. Every day Americans, approached by Jay Leno during popular segments of The Tonight Show, couldn't name the vice president or the three branches of government. He was thinking, how can these people not know anything recalled the 89-year-old Boca Raton resident.

The sight sent Kainer and other South Florida retirees on an unlikely mission to make sure students understand civics. They went to the Palm Beach County School District with the idea of starting a tournament that would encourage kids to learn more about the government. Kaiser even made up a list of 50 questions, from Who is the present president? to What is the date of the Declaration of Independence?

School district leaders were sold on the idea. So, from July to March, Kainer and a handful of other white-haired friends, all members of the Masonic High Twelve Lake Worth Club, visited schools, created a gold trophy and raised money for a \$500 cash prize.

Last month, they hosted the first-ever Government Bee, complete with Jeopardy-style buzzers and a bonus round.

It was something they were so passionate and lively about, said Shawn Servos, a District Administrator who helped plan the Bee. It was their everything for a while. The project fit nicely into the Masonic group's mission to support education - especially in government.

And they had a good time with it. One of the questions involved the Magna Carta, a document signed in 1215. When none of the students knew the answer, 84-year old Sidney King piped in. He said, 'You know how I know? Who do you think lent him the pen?' I said, 'I'm that old,' recalled King, president of the High Twelve Club.

With November just months away, Kainer thought the Bee was especially important: The elections are coming on and adults don't know what the heck is going on, who is who, et cetera.

He pointed to a survey of college graduates that found barely half knew the Constitution establishes the separation of powers, 43 percent could not identify the Chief Justice and 62 percent were unaware of the correct length of Congressional Terms of Office.

That convinced him that the quiz segment on The Tonight Show was not a set-up, as he'd originally thought.

But the local students, all seniors at four Lake Worth area high schools, knew quite a bit. School district administrators tossed out Kainer's questions in favor of tougher ones, including, Where are Tax Bills required to originate? Some of them stumped Kainer.

The questions I thought really had the students think hard about the workings of the government, said Santaluces High School Government Teacher Colleen Gleason, whose students won the competition. There were a number of questions where she was like, 'Oh my God, are they going to know this?' But they pulled it off.

On Monday, High Twelve members plan to take the winning team to dinner at the Red Lobster.

They've already begun talking about next year's tournament. The trophy was designed to travel from champion to champion... And the plan is to expand next year's Bee to 10 Palm Beach County Schools. Who knows where it will go from there, Kainer said. But he hopes the Bee will help encourage the next generation of voters and leaders to be more knowledgeable about their country. If they don't know now, he said, when are they going to know?

Northwest High Twelve Club No. 769: The meeting started on time at the Red Apple Restaurant, 2121 S. Plum Grove Road, Palatine. President George Rogers opened our meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by Brother Marvin Selock's opening prayer.

Don Van Cleave led the discussion on our participation in the Wolcott Foundation. Illinois High Twelve Bylaws recommend that contribution to Wolcott Foundation should be a voluntary two dollars per month. Our 2015-2016 (Our Club) contribution was \$16.48 per member/year which is excellent when compared to the eight Wolcott Zones. The average donation for Zone 4 (Illinois-Missouri) was \$7.08 member/year but the low Zone was only \$0.28 per member/year. A proposal that our Wolcott Foundation donation should be based on membership and not just on members that attend a meeting. Approximately sixty percent of our membership attends monthly meetings for contributions to the Wolcott Foundation. However, a \$210 contribution to the Wolcott Foundation from yearly dues would yield \$10 contribution per member/year and yield more than our current yearly \$95 contribution for our other charity fund. Approximately \$320 is presently available from our membership dues after the required Per Capita is paid to Illinois and International High Twelve. Additional review of Wolcott Foundation covered the Eight Trustees, Scholarship recipients who must be less than 30 years old and the forty credit hours can be used at twelve hours per semester if currently working for a government agency. Trustees are automatically renewed for five years if unchallenged.

Attendance today was ten members with five special guests (Mrs. Cathy Curielli, Mrs. Joan Rogers, Mrs. Ronnie Rund, Mrs. Julie Selock and Mrs. Rosemarie Pegoraro) who added to discussion and appearance. Today, Wolcott Foundation income was \$20 and seven (7) dollars available for our other charity. The funds available in our other charity has \$95.00 now available. At our May and June meetings, a decision will be made on where our charity funds will be applied and how to handle the Wolcott Foundation distribution.

Brother Rogers reviewed our emphasis on a visitation meeting at Cornerstone High Twelve and the Sunshine Club (Rainbow Girls), at Wheaton Temple. A possible June visit with Barrington Lodge's DeMolay Chapter is pending upon completion of Barrington Lodge remodeling.

You will find two articles, which were submitted and we hope you enjoy reading them. Continued follow up will be taken to obtain more articles for your reading enjoyment.

The first article is from Dr. Phyllis Genther Yoshida, who graduated with her M.A. in 1978 and received her Ph.D. in 1986.



Thank you High Twelve International for granting me a Wolcott Fellowship in 1976. I still remember somewhat nervously being driven by my father (a Master Mason) to be interviewed by the High Twelve Club in Dayton, Ohio during winter break my senior year of college. I was lucky to gain their sponsorship despite coming from the rival city of Cincinnati!

I am part of the generation inspired by President Kennedy's call to ask not what your country can do for you - ask what you can do for your country. Without the fellowship, it would have been difficult if not impossible to pursue the graduate studies that formed the basis for my career. I obtained my master's degree. Later, my George Washington University professors persuaded me to return and obtain a Ph.D. which I did successfully part-time while I worked. I also had an incredible opportunity to study for two years at the University of Tokyo as part of the

Fulbright program as I conducted research for my dissertation.

As I near retirement in the next year or so, I will do so as a member of the Senior Executive Service - the highest career rank in the federal government, having most recently served at the U.S. Department of Energy as the Deputy Assistant Secretary for Asia, Europe and the Americas. I have worked for the U.S. Congress, the U.S. Department of Commerce and the U.S. Department of Energy. I have visited over 60 countries, run a major public-private partnership conducting research for advanced automobiles, negotiated trade and technology agreements, created numerous bilateral and multilateral science and technology partnerships, met six U.S. Presidents, and helped U.S. industry gain access to foreign markets and benefit from technological advances overseas. I plan to continue contributing after I retire by teaching and writing.

My husband and I have also raised two sons who are now in their early twenties. I hope that they also will find the type of support as they set out on their careers as I did from High Twelve International and my professors at George Washington University.

In closing, it is more important than ever to support the development of dedicated competent career public servants. Thanks are too rare for those whose job is essential to effective government, both in providing continuity and in meeting the challenges of change.

The second article was provided by Ms. Amanda Conklin, who graduated in 2015.

I graduated in May 2015 with my Master's in International Affairs from George Washington University, with the help of the Wolcott Foundation Fellowship. When I applied to graduate school, I was working as a Fulbright English Teaching Assistant in Macao. My meetings with the U.S. State Department, the Hong Kong America Center, and the U.S. Chamber of Commerce in Hong Kong during this time had reinforced my desire to pursue a career in public service, and I knew I needed a Master's degree to be able to pursue opportunities to work for the government in the field of international affairs.

Additionally, I knew getting my degree in Washington D.C. would allow me to learn from experienced policy practitioners and the nation's top experts while also getting valuable experience interning or working in the field of international affairs. I gained admission to George Washington University's Elliott School of International Affairs, and the Wolcott Fellowship made attending financially possible and made me even more determined to make the most of the opportunity to go to graduate school in Washington D.C.

While attending the Elliott School of International Affairs, I received opportunities to attend the IMF-World Bank annual meetings as a representative of the Asian Development Bank, host a local TV show on modern China, lead a Congressional Staff Delegation overseas, mentor undergraduate researchers, present my thesis to the Center for Naval Analysis, and publish my writing with respected online news outlets. All of these experiences built on what I was learning in classes at the Elliott School and strengthened my understanding of international affairs.

My expertise in international affairs and connections from the experiences above helped me secure a full-time position at the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) while I was finishing up my coursework at the Elliott School in spring 2015.
